THE ELLIE BRAMHAM AWARD

This award is meant to honour one student who, like Ellie, contributes positively to the school. I am delighted to share with you this year's recipient.

When I think about being the new person in a school, even as a member of staff, this is never an easy task, yet the person who is the recipient of this year's Ellie Bramham Award arrived a little later to the year group and seemed to settle into the BBG family very quickly.

The thing that strikes you about this person is the huge, genuine smile; his positivity is clear to see. Despite the circumstances in which he arrived at BBG, he shook Mrs Luffman's hand and introduced himself with eye contact. He always asks people how they are, even staff (not totally unusual, but he really wants to know the answer – he is not just being polite). Mrs Luffman commented that this always makes her feel that he is a wonderful role model for all at BBG and that we have been blessed as we are a better school for having him here.

This student is everything we want our students at BBG to be. He has grasped every single opportunity on offer and made the most of every second; just recently he accepted some extra tuition which means that he has to stay later at school for the session. It would have been so easy for him to have turned it down as his schedule is already tightly packed, but he didn't.

In the classroom, he is a dream to teach. He works incredibly hard and has sought to understand very difficult ideas, never feeling discouraged (or not for long) and always works on things he doesn't understand at home. He asks questions, he seeks feedback, and genuinely listens to what he is told. He not only stays behind after his English lessons to ask for further explanations, he is also a regular at the unattractive P0 on a Friday morning and bookends it with a P7– he has a real thirst for knowledge and a stamina for learning that will help him to succeed in the future. He is very determined and if anyone deserves amazing grades, it is him. It is not just in English that he tries, he genuinely cares about his progress and efforts in all of his classes; he has spent a lot of his own time going above and beyond in all of his subjects.

His assessment grades keep on improving every week. He is the perfect example of resilience in the classroom. Once he admitted that he had not been a particularly good student before coming to BBG, perhaps even a little laid-back (according to him), but what he had been through and moving to the UK in the circumstances that he did, made him realise the power of education in opening doors for him. Not only is he revising for his UK GCSEs but he is also working on his Ukranian qualifications, so that he has options in the future.

Maths and Computer Science have become this student's passion, but when I asked him what he is most proud of, he said it was his developing understanding of English, which was already pretty good! He also treasures the friends he has made here, many of whom accompany him to the gym where he does weights (as cardio is not really his thing). He said that his view of the world has widened since he arrived in the UK as he thought that everyone lived in the way that he did in the Ukraine. I find he is curious about the world and not a little bit judgemental of others.

Having asked around about this student, it seems three words keep being repeated – thoughtful, funny and polite. Mrs Brack remembered telling him about a little girl from the Ukraine who was struggling to adjust to life in the UK, this discussion happened in the Summer. After the Summer holiday, he came to ask how she was doing. He is very close to his family. I have observed him taking his Mum's shopping out of her hands and carrying it and offering to help teachers carry books; he is thoughtful beyond his years. His Mum volunteers and he often talks about his family and you can see the pride in his eyes. He is especially proud of his Mum as she is the one who brought him here and made a life for them. His host family, were exactly that when he arrived – family - and he often talked about how they had played football with him and helped him with homework. He talks about his Dad and his Brother often, who are in Ukraine. When going back to Ukraine, he spoke of his little niece and what sweets he would bring her, being careful to buy sweets that would not melt.

His wit is very dry and he often catches his teachers unawares and makes them genuinely chuckle. Mrs Sullivan shared the time he wrote his work on a cardboard divider as he didn't have paper, delivering this with a typical shrug and apology! Miss Simpson said that all students love him, I think this is because he laughs at himself, finding the humour in his own mistakes -

he is a joy to be round. Another anecdote from Miss Simpson was when the class were discussing who was going to watch the Coronation and she was explaining what the importance of it was, when this student put his hand up and in his typical fashion said 'I'm not British' - the whole class burst out laughing, as did he. He has a heart of gold. An absolute dream of a student to teach.

This student is one of the most polite students I have ever met, his teachers also shared how he says hello at the start of lessons and thank you at the end.

He is no longer a newcomer, but a fully-fledged BBG student who we know will achieve whatever he sets his mind to in the future. It gives me great pleasure to award the Ellie Bramham Award to Illia Boiko.



Do you know that anything below 15°C is defined as cold water and can seriously affect your breathing and movement, so the risk is significant most of the year.

If you get into difficulty in the water:



- **Take a minute.** The initial effects of cold water pass in the less than a minute so don't try and swim straight away
- **Relax and float** on your back to catch your breath. Try to get hold of something that will help you float
- **Keep calm** then call for help or swim to safety if you're able

Artificial Intelligence

AI or Artificial Intelligence has been in the news recently. The term AI was first used in 1956, so it isn't a new phenomenon, but the increasingly complex design and programming of AI has developed since this date and now there are concerns that measures should be taken to protect humans from AI.

AI affects the way we live, and is in most things we use daily, like phones, video games and going shopping. AI is used in personal electronic devices, like phones and televisions, Alexa and Siri are both examples of this. Healthcare also uses AI, not only to help with research, but to take care of patients too. Farmers can also use AI to monitor their crops.

AI also has negative influences too. Artificial intelligence can also be used to write essays for students, create new music and make artwork. Therefore, creativity is stifled, as more people rely on technology.

Many people are also concerned that AI could lead to the extinction of humanity. AI is becoming more advanced every day, which means soon it may be able to control humans.

These are a few things scientists predict could possibly happen in the future if AI gets out of control:

- AI could be weaponised, which could result in millions of deaths
- AI generated misinformation could create problems around the world
- Enfeeblement- this is where humans become dependent on AI; this is similar to the film WALL-E
- It is also said that by 2050, at least 50% of jobs will be lost, due to AI and robots will be doing most of the work.

•In a world where social media already rules information that people consume, where it is difficult to know what is true or not, I feel that humanity needs to consider how AI is used. There are some amazing benefits of technology, but is the human touch still important in the increasingly complex world in which we live?



Year 10– Power and Conflict Poetry

HOW TO IMPROVE THE SLEEP OF YOUR STUDENTS

In Autumn last year, we launched our new Teen Sleep Hub, as part of our Teen Sleep Matters campaign, and it has been an amazing success so far with so many of you getting involved in sharing the information we supplied. We have also had lots of support from the Mental Health Foundation and Royal Society for Public Health.

Covid-19 continues to impact on the health and wellbeing of young people, in particular around their sleep and mental health. Even with the return to school, we are still living in uncertain times and young people are still suffering with isolation, learning at home with bubble closures, out-of-school activities suspended and routines being altered dramatically, it has been, and remains, extremely challenging.

Since we last made contact we have been working hard to continue to push this campaign and we have now launched a Live Chat service on our **Teen Sleep Hub**. This facility is available on Tuesday and Thursdays from 6-8pm so young people can chat about any issues they are having with their sleep with one of our trained sleep practitioners. Please do direct your students to this and even inform parents of this service.

In this second pack you will find

- A selection of NEW posters promoting the Live Chat that can be emailed out to students and parents and, when normally resumes, can be printed and put up in classrooms, toilet facilities and other communal areas
- Social media graphics that you can use on your social channels and website to direct students and parents to the Teen Sleep Hub

As a reminder, the Teen Sleep Hub is a hive of information around sleep aimed at teens (not their parents) and includes a downloadable eBook and a series of top tips videos. We were supported on this project by our amazing Youth Advisory Panel, made up of young people aged between 13 and 19, across the country. It has been a great success so far with over **17,000 downloads of the eBook**, proving that young people want the knowledge to help them improve their sleep.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

ANIME

Anime, which originates from Japan, is currently one of the most popular sources of entertainment in the world. This style of animation goes back to the mid 20th century, with a broad audience ranging from children to adults. Known for its epic stories, anime often crosses over with video games and other avenues of pop culture via adaptations or spin-offs, such as Cyberpunk: Edgerunners, an anime web series based on the popular video game, Cyberpunk 2077. The most common intersect, however, is manga: a form of graphic novel from which most anime is adapted.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Some people assume that anime is safe for children purely because it's animation. However, a large amount is actually geared towards adults, often featuring swearing, graphic violence and nudity. Many anime series follow dark storylines, such as Cyberpunk: Edgerunners, which has easily become known for its extreme gore, sexual content and disturbing depictions of mental health conditions.

COMMON CROSSOVERS

It's easy for children to get drawn into anime through its many crossovers into video games, such as Fortnite and Call of Duty, while anime art styles are often used for other products, due to its popularity. Titles like the 3RD Gender Impact may look quite cute and accessible, but its loot-box mechanics can introduce young players to behaviours that have much in common with gambling.

DECEPTIVE APPEARANCE

It's easy to mistake anime graphics for a sign of harmless, child-friendly content. This style (big eyes, colourful hair and cute voices), however, can disguise some extremely adult themes. Yanders Simulator, for example, strongly resembles a child's game at face value, thanks to its art style, but in reality it features incredibly dark themes such as murder, kidnapping and torture.

ROBLOX REPRODUCTIONS

There are hundreds of user-created Roblox games which take their inspiration from anime and manga. While many of these titles will be perfectly age-appropriate, there are some that begin to focus on the storylines of adult and horror anime. Death Note, for example (based on the manga and anime series of the same name) would probably be extremely disturbing for most younger players.

MATURE MANGA

The majority of anime is adapted from manga: a form of Japanese comic book. Manga usually features an age rating on the back cover, and it's worth bearing in mind that just because it's a comic, that doesn't mean it's suitable for youngsters. In fact, most popular manga lines heavily feature darker subject matter, which is unquestionably aimed at an adult audience.

ADULT THEMES

Hentai is a type of manga, anime and video game which revolves around characters engaging in explicit sexual encounters. While anime of this kind is usually only found on pornography sites, some gaming platforms, such as Steam, do offer the sale of these titles (referred to as '18-Games' in the community) and even feature them on the front of their store page when sales are on.

Advice for Parents & Carers

DO YOUR RESEARCH

Despite all the problematic content, there's still a lot of anime out there which is completely child-friendly. Pokémon and One Piece are all long-running anime shows which have family-friendly stories and content. Make sure you check for age ratings and content warnings on streaming platforms when deciding if a particular anime series is suitable for your child.

IT'S NOT JUST TV

Anime is most often in the format of a TV series, but it is also presented as films. Studio Ghibli is often referred to as 'the Japanese Disney' due to the quality and number of films they produce. Most of their movies are fine for children, though they often feature more mature subject matter than western animation: Grave of the Fireflies, for instance, is set in Japan during the Second World War.

WATCH WITH YOUR CHILD

Anime covers a multitude of topics, so it's easy to find something that the whole family can enjoy. Anime shows typically involve action and adventure, superheroes, romance, comedy and much more. Watching this content alongside your child isn't only a way to spend quality time together - it will also help you to spot quite quickly if there's potential for any difficult topics to arise in the show.

CHECK GAMES' FEATURES

Often, crossovers with video games simply involve using anime characters as 'skins' to modify the appearance of characters while playing (as in Fortnite, for example). If your child's interested in an anime-inspired game that you're unfamiliar with, however, look online at the game's features and for any content warnings to gain a clearer idea of what your child might be exposed to.
