The Importance of Resilience (Continued)

As a group, students 'applied' for a car loan looking at all the information they need to provide and why it is needed. Students were advised on the pitfalls of suspicious links that they can receive through their emails or via social media. We also learnt about what data is gathered on them whilst using such apps. The guests provided students with top tips on how credit works and how their data is stored.









Full time Nurse Practitioner Gemma brought the wealth and depth of her experience of forging a career through the NHS to BBG, and took our students through her journey from school to where she is today. Gemma explained not only the academic qualifications but also the attributes of a nurse, inspiring others to make it to their end goal and using grit and resilience! Pupils were then able to put into practice what they had learned about fractures and broken bones to help each other cast and splint their imaginary ailments!















Year 9 students were tasked had sessions with civil engineering BAM. They went through different careers within the company and students took part in their own engineering task. They also talked about routes into engineering and the different jobs available.



The Salt Market

In a recent Science lesson, students learned how to create salt from rock salt. The students were tasked with calculating the amount of rock salt they needed to buy in order to make a profit. They also had to work quickly and safely to make the salt.

The students started by researching the market price of salt. They then calculated the cost of buying rock salt and the cost of the energy needed to evaporate the water. They also considered the cost of their time and labour.

Once the students had calculated their costs, they were able to determine how much rock salt they needed to buy in order to make a profit. They then set up their experiments and began to create salt. The students worked quickly and safely to evaporate the water from the rock salt, by the end of the lesson the students had created a significant amount of salt. They were able to sell the salt back to their teacher for a profit.

The students were also aware of the unstable market for salt. The price of salt can fluctuate depending on a variety of factors, such as the weather, the supply and demand, and the cost of energy.

The students kept an eye on the price of salt throughout the lesson. They were able to sell their salt for a profit when the price was high. However, they also had to be careful not to sell their salt when the price was low.








On Tuesday, we had the pleasure of meeting Vicky, Becky and Jane, in the morning and Gabby and Josh in the afternoon from YBS. They spoke to Year 8 students about the importance of budgeting.

Students were asked what they would do if they were given £1,000,000 and had to consider whether they were a spender or a saver. Different ways of saving money and preparing for future events, both planned and unexpected, were discussed. Students were taught the difference between wants and needs and financial terminology such as being in the red or in the black was explained.

This week students have been looking at careers in history. Through a joint 'Careers in Humanities' lesson, students discovered ways in which they could express their interest in history through TV. Pupils examined three relevant jobs:

Archive Producers research old media needed for new television shows. For example, if a documentary is being made about British gangsters then the archive producer will sift through old clips, newspapers, and pictures to find relevant footage that can be used in the show.

Props Masters are in charge of creating and maintaining props for TV. Although this is a creative job, an element of historical research is required to ensure period-appropriate

Set Designers have a similar job, however rather than designing specific items they are in charge of researching, designing and maintaining entire backdrops. A good example of this is the show 'Bridgerton'.






Students in Year 8 have been learning about careers in the creative industry; the fastest growing sector in the Leeds city region. They have looked at the wide range of jobs that exist, from lighting artists to production managers. Our theme of the lesson was costume design, where students were asked to create an outfit design based on a character profile. 



Casper underwent a special test to become an official therapy dog. Joanne explained that once his little neck scarf goes on, Casper knows it is time to work. He is a total pro!








We were treated to a fantastic presentation in Child Development this week. Charlie Duree, from **Helen Howes Private Day Nursery** gave an inspiring talk on the development of children.

An understanding of how children learn was absolutely fabulous, particularly how important the early stages are in terms introduction to certain development stages. Charlie spoke about the complex development needs of children and gave us some great insight on the science behind child development.





Synapse formation and synaptic pruning really helped the students rationalise some of the research they have already done for their first assignment in Child Development.



Students explored ideas around advertising and why big brands still advertise. Year 9 got a taste of the varied careers in television production when they learned what a commissioner's and a casting director's role involves. Commissioners were given two programme pitches to read through and then had to decide which programme they would commission for the target audience. After that, they got the chance to flex their own creative skills by coming up with their own idea for a new show. There were some interesting concepts: from a show where pets competed to get new owners, to a reality show starring two of our own pupils (who were both convinced it would get huge ratings!). Our casting agents were on the look out for perspective game show and Teens Go Dating participants. Using their creative writing skills, students had to entice people to apply for the next season.

The Rugby World Cup

Belonging to a Welsh family means you can't escape the Rugby World Cup! The first game was last weekend, and the competition is being held in France. Twenty countries from around the world will compete to win the prestigious William Webb Ellis Trophy. The matches will be held in six stadiums across France, in cities including Bordeaux, Lille, Lyon, Marseille and Nantes, with the final being played in Paris on Saturday 28th October. The competition takes place over seven weeks with four pools of five teams.

This is the 10th Rugby World Cup, South Africa won the last tournament in Japan in 2019. It is also the sport's 200th birthday year and the tournament will showcase the amazing game of rugby, alongside celebrating its development over two centuries.

Rugby was founded, according to legend, in 1823, during a school football game in the town of Rugby, when a young man named William Webb Ellis picked up the ball and ran towards the opposition goal line. Over two centuries the game has developed into one of the world's most popular sports. At the heart of the game of rugby is an ethos of playing the game to the laws and within the spirit of the laws. Often seen as a more disciplined game than football, both players and supporters of the game are also fair to each other and respectful of all clubs and nations that compete.

Cup have competed before except Chile, who will make their debut this time.

The favourites to win this year are France, South Africa and Ireland, but Wales, Australia and England could be the surprise teams. Last year New Zealand were the favourites to win, but they haven't had a good start and lost to France 27-13.

The Rugby World Cup began in 1987 and is held every four years. All the competing teams in the 2023 World

The home nations have started strongly with Wales beating Fiji 32-26, England beating Argentina 27-10 and Ireland thrashing Romania, who are rank outsiders, 82-8. Scotland however lost their first match against South Africa.

Analysis of week 1

England were led to victory by George Ford who kicked all 27 points for the side

Wales set a new world cup tackle record – they had to put in 252 tackles to beat Fiji

Fiji made the most carries in an opening round, (taking the ball and moving it a certain number of metres), in this case 176 times

The top three tacklers of week 1 were all Welsh: Will Rowlands, Gareth Thomas and Jac Morgan.

So, what will week 2 bring? England play Japan, Ireland will face Tonga and Wales will go again against Australia.

Looking forward to another Welsh win this weekend, and secretly hoping that Wales can go all the way! However, good luck to all the other countries taking part and whichever team you are supporting.
