#### Tips For New Year 7s


Starting a new school can and will be tricky and nerve-wracking for most people. Therefore, it's only natural that there'll be ways to make it easier for yourself – many of which you might never have thought of.

For me, I can't stress enough how joining new groups can make year 7 that much easier for you.

I interviewed Marlie Parker, a real Year 7, and asked for her personal tips on how to make your first year of school much better. She believes that:

- 1. You should be "open to friendships" Year 7 is, arguably, the most important year for making new friends, and restricting your friend groups is one of the worst things you can do. However, she also states that you should...
- 2. "Find friends that like you for who you are" and don't "only talk to you if they need something from you. For example, homework if they keep asking you to do their homework for them and don't want to be around you otherwise, they might not be a real friend. Don't argue with your friends"







- 3. "Pay attention in lessons if you get put on the spot and you don't know what the teacher was talking about, you might get a verbal warning or a comment, which can be upsetting, especially if you end up getting detention."
- 4. "Don't leave your homework until last minute if you leave it until the final day, you won't have time to get help from a teacher or one of your friends, and you'll get a homework comment."
- "Be organised. If you don't have things you're meant to, then... yeah. Pack your bag before you go to bed, so you don't have to remember in the morning."
- Similar to what I said earlier, Marlie says you should "Try new clubs". She does "Drama, Science Club and Netball, but I'm thinking about joining new clubs to make more friends."

One from me – don't follow the crowd. Be your own person – if you won't be yourself, who will? However tempting it might be to be a sheep, you'll always be happier when you aren't, and instead embrace your true self.

#### **Black History Month**

It is time to focus on other cultures and acknowledge key Black figures who are often overlooked. 
Originally from Nigeria, she was a Princess and given as a gift to Queen Victoria. Omaba had to change her name, so that it sounded more European. She was cared for by the Queen, who grew to like her. She eventually had a child of her own who was Queen Victoria's Goddaughter!

Dido lived from 1761 to 1804. She was mixed race woman; her mother was West African, and her father was British. She was the first Black member of the upper class of British society and her portrait still hangs in Kenwood House. She was loved by her family, but quite often she was unable to be part of social gatherings because of her race.

You may have studied all these periods of history but not from a black perspective. These wonderful and colourful characters form the past need to find their voice and tell their stories. We can make that change and ensure that we do not look at history through one lens but widen our curiosity to capture all the stories from all the backgrounds in the past.





#### Contextual Curriculum: The Industrial Revolution, Peterloo, and Protest

They say that those who don't learn from the mistakes of the past are doomed to repeat them, and this is an idea that Year 8 have been coming to terms with this week in the historical part of their contextual curriculum. Year 8s have grappled with the Industrial Revolution and how it changed Britain from an agricultural country of predominantly farmers to an urban society, focussed in towns and cities producing items in factories. The changes these bought were devastating for many, including longer working hours, miserable conditions, and poor pay, with many people not even being able to vote for their own government! This bought about many protests, such as the Peterloo Massacre in Manchester, 1819.

Astute as always, year 8 independently linked these events to real-world issues, such as the Cost of Living Crisis. However, they also studied the similarities between these past events and current affairs on a global scale; year 8 learnt that during the Peterloo Massacre workers were just trying to demonstrate for their rights to fair compensation and a voice for all in government, but were stopped when magistrates sent in the army who brutally shut the protestors down. Today, events across the globe, such as in Sri Lanka, reflect this, with many people still unable to protest peacefully or have their voice heard in government! We hope that year 8 come to realise that history is a mirror to our own time, and use lessons from the past to try and make the world a better place.

#### Year 10 and Year 11 Theatre Trip


- All KS4 students have been invited to attend a theatre trip to see a performance of their GCSE modern drama text: An Inspector Calls in January 2023.




YEAR 11 REMINDER - Homework club Monday 2.30-3pm F17

Their introductory lesson to this time period reflects the nature of their broad historical study in which they have developed knowledge of Art, Science, Technology and Travel. They will now apply this to an explanation of developments in medicine. Next, they will investigate the achievements of those who have challenged the mistakes of the past when 'Medicine stood still' and their new lines of enquiry.







#### Part two: The beginnings of change

- The impact of the Renaissance on Britain: challenge to medical authority in anatomy, physiology and surgery; the work of Vesalius, Paré, William Harvey; opposition to change.
- Dealing with disease: traditional and new methods of treatments; quackery; methods of treating disease; plague; the growth of hospitals; changes to the training and status of surgeons and physicians; the work of John Hunter.
- Prevention of disease: inoculation; Edward Jenner, vaccination and opposition to change.









## Why are there bookwork checks, and how do they work?

We believe that a good standard of bookwork is very important in helping students to embed good practice, and to help them and their teachers to keep track of any misconceptions.

- In Sparx, every question is accompanied by a 'bookwork code'.
- Your child should write this down, and then write their workings and answer next to the code.
- When they are asked for the answer they gave for a particular bookwork code, they need to give the exact answer they wrote down, even if it was wrong.
- Here's an example of good bookwork; as you can see all workings and wrong answers have been recorded:



- If a student fails a bookwork check in Sparx, they will need to re-do the question, even if they originally gave the correct answer. This is to encourage them to record their workings.
- The more bookwork checks your child gets correct, the fewer they'll see.

#### How can I support my child when they're stuck?

- Even if your child thinks they will answer incorrectly, they should make the first attempt on a question without assistance. This will enable the teacher to see what they are working on, and also helps Sparx and School correctly determine their level.
- Each question is accompanied by a help video. Watching the video with your child is a
  great way to support and encourage them with the question.
- If your child gets a question wrong three times, Sparx will suggest they seek help.
- The teacher will also be notified that they need help with this particular question.
- You can also contact the child's teacher for help using the school's normal communication channels.
- To help the teacher, we recommend supporting your child in writing down their workings clearly in their book. You can share this with the teacher to help them identify the problem.
- Parents whose children have been set Compulsory homework will receive a weekly email from Sparx, which includes an update on how much homework their child has completed as well as any they have outstanding from the previous few weeks. Most importantly, the email contains a link to a short video that parents can watch and use to help support their child in answering one of their Target questions.

### What happens if my child can't complete their work?

 If for some reason they cannot complete the work that has been set, you, or your child should contact their teacher and seek further advice.



#### **GODARD 's LEGACY**

Godard, who died 3 weeks ago, has been recognised as one of the most influential filmmakers of the 20th century and one of the leaders of the French New Wave. In 1969, film critic Roger Ebert wrote about Godard's importance in cinema:

-Godard is a director of the very first rank; no other director in the 1960s has had more influence on the development of the feature-length film. Like Joyce in fiction or Beckett in theater, he is a pioneer whose present work is not acceptable to present audiences. But his influence on other directors is gradually creating and educating an audience that will, perhaps in the next generation, be able to look back at his films and see that this is where their cinema began.

Filmmaker Quentin Tarantino named a production company he founded A Band Apart, a reference to Godard's 1964 film. Fritz Lang agreed to take part in Godard's film <u>Le Mépris</u> due to his admiration of Godard as a director. Akira Kurosawa listed <u>À bout de souffle</u> as one of his 100 favorite films. Four of Godard's films are included on the British Film Institute (BFI) <u>Sight and Sound</u> magazine list of 100 Greatest Films: <u>À bout de souffle</u> (13), <u>Le Mépris</u> (21), <u>Pierrot le Fou</u> (42), and <u>Histoire(s) du cinéma</u> (48).














Year 9 used distillation techniques to separate water from inky water. This involved carrying out a detailed risk assessment.



The charity has been operating since 2009 when the founder's young child was diagnosed with cancer. Having to spend long periods of time in hospital she realised that it added to her child's distress having to wear a hospital gown. No child wants to be in hospital but if they have to be they want to be as comfortable as possible.

Over time, our pyjamas were requested from other establishments so the charity decided to make donations to other places that had poorly or underprivileged children.

To support children when visiting restrictions were put in place in hospitals, Children's Hospital Pyjamas put together a team of volunteers to sew handmade hearts. These are now included in every pair of pyjamas that we donate. A heart for the child and another for anyone they choose to share it with. A way of staying together even when apart.

Children's Hospital Pyjamas are not government funded and rely solely on donations made to us.

#### HOW TO IMPROVE THE SLEEP OF YOUR STUDENTS

In Autumn last year, we launched our new Teen Sleep Hub, as part of our Teen Sleep Matters campaign, and it has been an amazing success so far with so many of you getting involved in sharing the information we supplied. We have also had lots of support from the Mental Health Foundation and Royal Society for Public Health.

Covid-19 continues to impact on the health and wellbeing of young people, in particularly around their sleep and mental health. Even with the return to school, we are still living in uncertain times and young people are still suffering with isolation, learning at hon with bubble closures, out-of-school activities suspended and routines being altered dramatically, it has been, and remains, extremely challenging.

Since we last made contact we have been working hard to continue to push this campaign and we have now launched a Live Chat service on our Teen Sleep Hub. This facility is available on Tuesday and Thursdays from 6-8pm so young people can chat about any issues they are having with their sleep with one of our trained sleep practitioners. Please do direct your students to this and even inform parents of this service

- A selection of NEW posters promoting the Live Chat that can be emailed out to students and parents and, when normality resumes, can be printed and put up in classrooms, toilet facilities and other communal areas
- Social media graphics that you can use on your social channels and website to direct students and parents to the Teen Sleep Hub

As a reminder, the Teen Sleep Hub is a hive of information around sleep aimed at teens (not their parents) and includes a downloadable eBook and a series of top tips videos. We were supported on this project by our amazing Youth Advisory Panel, made up of young people aged between 13 and 19, across the country. It has been a great success so far with er 17,000 downloads of the eBook, proving that young people want the knowledge to help them improve their sleep.
