Over the past 12 months BBGNews reporters have interviewed BBG staff and the CEO Mr Goulty. This week Team English thought it would be a great idea to turn the tables and interview them! First up Dexter Hughes (Year 9), BBGNews Editor....

How long have you been writing for The Bulletin? Since the club opened. I've always felt a passion for writing and a club in which I'd be writing every week would be a great way to improve my writing!





How do you feel writing published articles/creative writing has improved your work?

I can see how different my first and most recent articles are - it has helped me enjoy writing more, and might have got me back into reading.

What do you enjoy about writing?

I love the creativity that it allows - in maths, your answer is either right or wrong - there's only one right answer. In History, there are still right and wrong answers, but you can still answer questions in different ways.

In English and, consequentially, in writing too, however, you can take two students' works and they will be entirely different! There are different writing styles, people have different favourite words - it's great, and I can put myself into my writing more than I can put myself into anything else.

Who is your favourite writer and why?

George Orwell - although I've only read one of his books (Animal Farm) and am in the middle of one of his other works (1984) and am currently the owner of Fighting in Spain and Shooting an Elephant (a collection of his essays). I know that I love his style of writing. His novels 1984 and Animal Farm are known for their political 'things' (I'm not sure what you call them) - when I was reading Animal Farm, and I discovered the allegory for the Russian revolution (the word 'Animalism' certainly gave it away), I audibly went "Ooooh".

Do you have any aspirations to be a famous writer?

I know that I love writing, and would want a career involving it - however, being an author would be hundreds of times better than any other 'writing' career. I haven't settled on what genre of book I'd like to write, but I was captivated by 'Frankenstein' and know I love detective fiction - maybe, if I choose to be a writer, I'll go in the middle and mix the genres. So, going back to the question - I'd love to be a writer, although I don't particularly aspire to be famous.

What advice would you give younger students who think they may want to write or join one of BBG's clubs?

One tip. Don't let peer pressure get to you. If you want to write, write. If you want to join a club, join a club. Be yourself and your mental health will be all the better for it!

What is your favourite book?

Do football and human rights go together? Part 2

Last week, I wrote about the football World Cup in Qatar and the human rights issues associated with the host nation. Qatar has a proven history of poor human rights for its people and many across the world have questioned if the World Cup should have even been staged here.

The World Cup has got off to a sizzling start; The Three Lions roared to a 6-2 victory against Iran, Wales had a pleasing draw against USA and there have been surprise wins for Japan and Saudi Arabia.

There have also been some interesting developments where football teams, presenters and fans have highlighted specific human rights issues.

In the England v Iran match the Iranian team refused to sing their national anthem in protest against the human rights issues in their country; female fans held up 'Women's Rights' banners and openly cried in the stands. The German team posed for their pre-match photograph and held their hands over their mouths to protest against FIFA's ban of the rainbow captain armbands.

Captains of the teams from the seven European nations competing in the World Cup — England, Wales, Germany, Denmark, Belgium, Switzerland, and the Netherlands were due to wear an armband with a rainbow to promote diversity and rights for the LGBTQ+ community. In a last-minute decision FIFA overruled this and banned the armbands warning that the captains would face a instant yellow card if they were worn.

Threats from FIFA came hours before England's Harry Kane, the Netherlands' Virgil van Dijk and Wales' Gareth Bale were due to wear the armbands in games taking place last Monday. However, the captains of Belgium, Switzerland, Germany, and Denmark had also pledged to wear the armbands in their next matches.

The unpopular decision shows that there is a political situation surrounding the World Cup in Qatar. The FIFA president asked all thirty-two national teams to keep politics off the soccer field.



Do football and human rights go together? Part 2

Television presenter, Alex Scott, was seen wearing one of the armbands whilst she was presenting on screen. This has drawn positive attention and she was praised for highlighting the issues even in such a controversial climate.

The ex - Wales football captain has said she felt intimidated when she was told to remove her rainbow bucket hat when she entered a World Cup stadium in Qatar. Laura McAllister, a gay woman, said she was told she could not wear the hat for the Welsh opening match. She said she then smuggled the hat into the stadium. The "rainbow wall" version of Welsh fan hats shows support for the LGBTQ+ community. The Football Association of Wales said it was "extremely disappointed" by reports that supporters and FAW staff members were asked to remove and discard their Rainbow Wall bucket hats before entry to the stadium.



Persistence and Variety





It really was lovely to see both current and former BBG students on the stage.



















It has been another busy week within the Contextual Curriculum course.


Some of the RS cohort have been debating the existence of evil and if it is something that only theists should concern themselves with.

Meanwhile in Geography, students have been looking at the Qatar World Cup and asking if it should be boycotted in response to the country's Human Rights violations, focusing on the mistreatment of migrant workers and members of the LGBTQ+ community. RS has focused on the impact of religious teachings on political decisions and how the same views have changed in the UK over time.

Many were shocked to find out that the UK did not have a Human Rights Act until 1998 and that members of the LGBTQ+ community did not have complete equal rights until 2014.



In History students have explored why Putin is often compared to a Russian Tsar. As we explore a Russian history of autocratic rule, students have investigated the nature of Russia in 1900 and the reasons for communist revolution. This understanding is key to the context of the current war with Ukraine as we move next to an exploration of Cold War that followed.







Media in Context students are starting to create presentations this week, exploring the dilemma surrounding the negatives and benefits of social media. Over the half term students have been collecting research in preparation for this project with the winners being announced next week

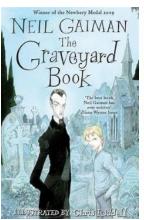































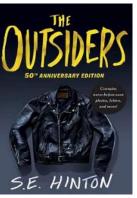



















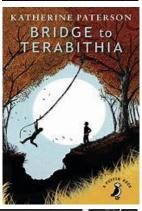









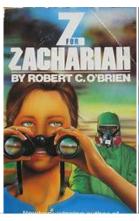








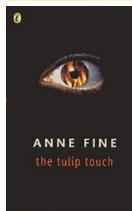






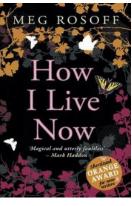


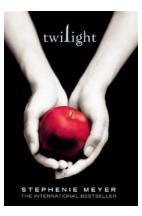


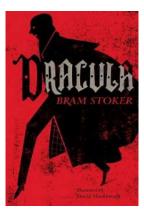


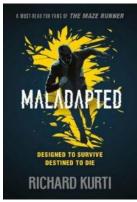




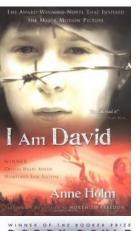


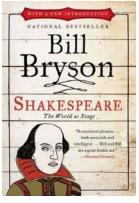


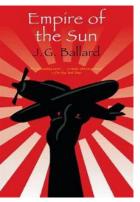


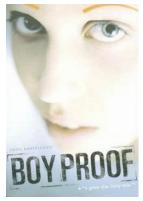


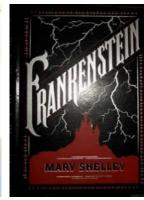


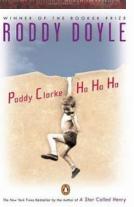


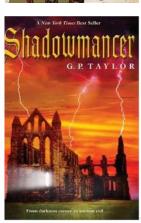


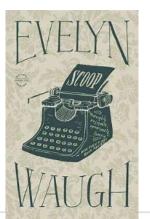


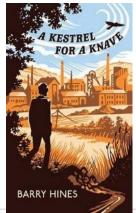








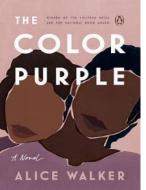








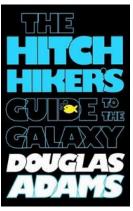
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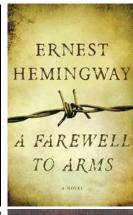








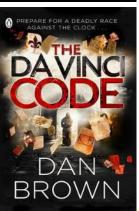







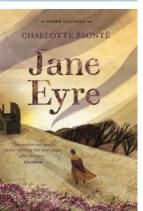


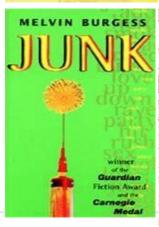


















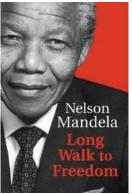


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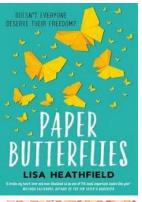


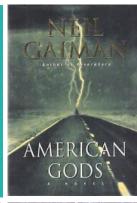




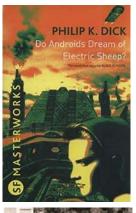


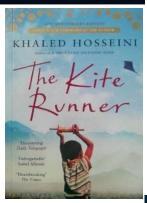


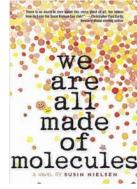


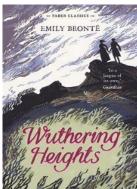




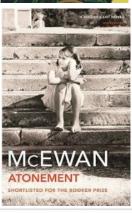


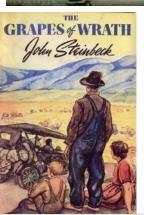


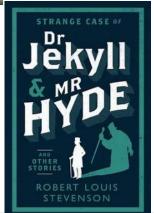















BBG BOOKCASE


Year 10

Year 10 students are coming to the end of their current topic - Q 3 & 5 Resources. In particular, students take an in depth look into a large scale water transfer scheme 'The Lesotho Highland Project', in which Lesotho receive a payment every month from South Africa to share their water!



Year 11

Our Year 11 are well on their way with the last topic for Paper 2 – The Changing Economic World. Students have learnt how development can be measured through a variety of ways, and how we live in a world of uneven development. Students will start to look more closely at development in Nigeria before carrying out their mock exams in December. A reminder that we set weekly homework in Geography, and to support students with this we do run a homework club 2.30-3pm in F17.





Year 10 - assessment practice


Mrs Sullivan's GCSE group have been working on their ability to write under pressure and complete a GCSE question based on the German Weimar Government. This was based on whether it was the economy or culture which created a Golden Age. Students spent some time in the lessons deciding what was the most important factor; money or entertainment. Students were taught the exam technique of "Point, Evidence, Explain, Link back to the question" and given tips on how to write fluently under pressure. With mocks coming up in January it is important students practise exams questions and use P7s to improve on previous exam question practice. We are happy in the department to help, as GCSEs are a big leap from Year 9 work. It is pleasing to see a number of pupils using their time effectively in lessons and using purple pen to improve on their work which is indicated below.



The **2022 FIFA World Cup** is a football tournament, which will take place in Qatar from 20 November to 18 December 2022. This will be the first World Cup to be held in the Arab world, and the second World Cup held entirely in Asia after the 2002 tournament in South Korea and Japan.

The tournament will be the last with 32 participating teams, as the field will increase to 48 teams for the 2026 tournament. Matches at the event will be played in eight venues across five cities. France are the defending champions, having defeated Croatia 4–2 in the 2018 FIFA World Cup final. Because of Qatar's intense summer heat and humidity, this World Cup will be held during November and December, being the first tournament not held in May, June, or July and to take place in the northern winter. It will be played in a reduced timeframe of 29 days. The opening match will be between Qatar and Ecuador at Al Bayt Stadium, Al Khor. The final will be held on 18 December 2022, Qatar's national day.

But giving the hosting rights to Qatar was a "mistake" for many. The choice to host the World Cup in Qatar has been the source of significant controversy. These include Qatar's poor treatment of migrant workers, poor human rights record, persecution of LGBT+ people, among others, leading to allegations of 'sportswashing'. Others have said Qatar's intense climate and lack of a strong football culture is evidence of bribery for hosting rights and wider FIFA corruption. Boycotts of the event are planned by several countries, clubs, and individual players.



real test, however, came when we started doing calculations based on these results. Strong maths skills and good listening combined with helping on another helped us all be successful.













Year 8 students studied the lungs, making model lungs and even watching a dissection of some sheep lungs. The most fun was had, however, when we came to find the volume of our lungs which involved teamwork, skill, lots of water and a mop!!











Year 7 students carried out a separating technique called chromatography. This involved using water as a solvent to see which inks were actually mixtures. This is the technique used by scientists to check if athletes have cheated by using drugs. In this case the felt tips are replaced by samples of athletes' urine.

Year 9

Year 9 students carried out distillation as a method to extract distilled water from a sample of contaminated water. In this practical students learned about evaporation and condensation, a skill that could save their lives one day.



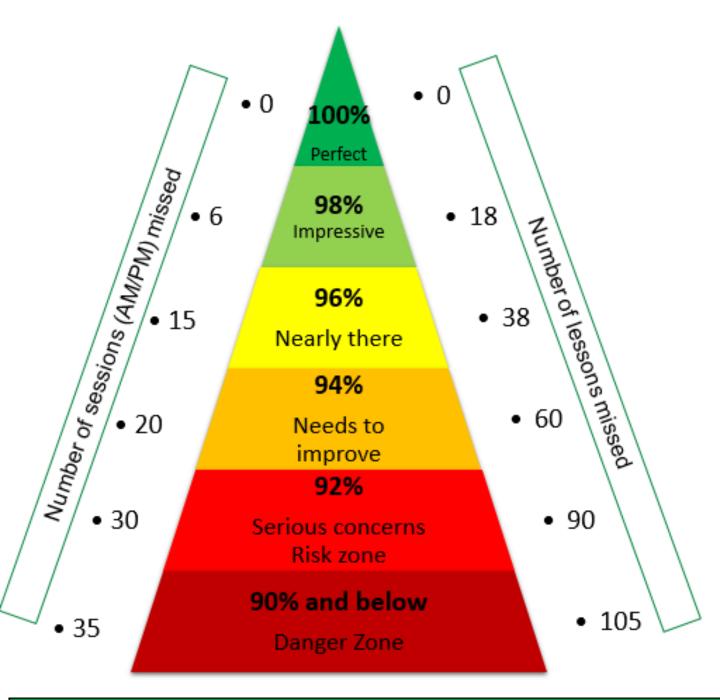

HOW TO IMPROVE THE SLEEP OF YOUR STUDENTS

In Autumn last year, we launched our new Teen Sleep Hub, as part of our Teen Sleep Matters campaign, and it has been an amazing success so far with so many of you getting involved in sharing the information we supplied. We have also had lots of support from the Mental Health Foundation and Royal Society for Public Health.

Covid-19 continues to impact on the health and wellbeing of young people, in particularly around their sleep and mental health. Even with the return to school, we are still living in uncertain times and young people are still suffering with isolation, learning at hon with bubble closures, out-of-school activities suspended and routines being altered dramatically, it has been, and remains, extremely challenging.

Since we last made contact we have been working hard to continue to push this campaign and we have now launched a Live Chat service on our Teen Sleep Hub. This facility is available on Tuesday and Thursdays from 6-8pm so young people can chat about any issues they are having with their sleep with one of our trained sleep practitioners. Please do direct your students to this and even inform parents of this service

In this second pack you will find

- A selection of NEW posters promoting the Live Chat that can be emailed out to students and parents and, when normality resumes, can be printed and put up in classrooms, toilet facilities and other communal areas
- Social media graphics that you can use on your social channels and website to direct students and parents to the Teen Sleep Hub

As a reminder, the Teen Sleep Hub is a hive of information around sleep aimed at teens (not their parents) and includes a downloadable eBook and a series of top tips videos. We were supported on this project by our amazing Youth Advisory Panel, made up of young people aged between 13 and 19, across the country. It has been a great success so far with er 17,000 downloads of the eBook, proving that young people want the knowledge to help them improve their sleep.

TRUST YOUR INSTINCTS

It's safest to stick with well-known, reputable retailers. If a site doesn't look professional, or has weird pop-up ads, it's best to steer clear – no matter how tempting their prices. If something seems too good to be true, it probably is!



WATCH OUT FOR PHISHING ATTACKS

Email inboxes are flooded on Black Friday by retailers telling everyone about their deals. Hackers often try to use the traffic as camouflage; loc out for emails with poor grammar, suspicious email addresses and pixelated images – these are all common signs you've been targeted.



MAKE SURE THE SITE'S SECURE

When you're buying online, look for a padk icon near the address bar – or check if the URL includes "https" or "shttp". The extra 's' or the padlock

fore you go online, make a list of what you're looking for -and stick to it. With enticing deals everywhere you look, it's so easy to get immersed in bargain hunting and end up the time you log off!



LOOK OUT FOR LOOT BOX SALES

Video gaming companies also offer Black Friday deals, with as much as 50% off loot es in some titles. Children can also buy reduced-price games through their consoles. So if your child can access the online store or make in-game purchases on their device, it'd be wise to talk to them in advance.



READ THE O. REVIEWS

We've all bought something which sounded amazing online, only for it to be far less impressive when it actually arrived. Take time to read other buyers' views on an item – and think twice about anything that only has a smo number of comments about it.



CREATE SECURE PASSWORDS

On Black Friday, there's a higher likelihood of you setting up accounts on sites you've never bought from before. Choose a different password for each: the longer, the better. It's best practice to use a mix of upperand lower-case letters, symbols and



CHECK THE 8. SMALL PRINT

Make sure you check out details like a seller's returns policy. It's so easy to shop impulsively on Black Frida and then be stuck with thin you don't want because of a very small window for returning goods.



IGNORE INFLUENCER PRESSURE


